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## II. ANNOTATIONS TO THE PROVISIONAL AGENDA

## Item 1 Election of officers

1. In accordance with rule 18 of the rules of procedure of the main Committees of the Trade and Development Board, the Commission shall elect a Chairman, five Vice-Chairmen and a Rapporteur from among the representatives of its members, taking into account the need to ensure equitable geographical distribution. Rule 19 of the rules of procedure states that the Bureau of the Commission shall consist of seven members (i.e. four members from Lists A and C combined, two members from List B and one member from List D referred to in the annex to General Assembly resolution 1995 (XIX) as amended).

2. Accordingly, following the cycle of rotation established after UNCTAD IX, the bureau for the third session of the Commission shall be as follows: Chairman from List D; Rapporteur from List C; and five Vice-Chairmen (3 from Lists A and C, and 2 from List B).

## Item 2 Adoption of the agenda and organization of work

3. The provisional agenda for the third session of the Commission, as reproduced in section I above, was approved by the Commission at its second session on 21 November 1997 (TD/B/45/2, annex IV).

4. Concerning the organization of the work of the session, the Commission has five days available to it. It is suggested that the agenda items be taken up sequentially, with the first plenary meeting on Monday, 28 September, being devoted to procedural matters, introductory statements and the commencement of the discussion under item 3. The last plenary meeting, on Friday, 2 October, would be devoted to the adoption of any formal action and to items 7 and 8.

5. The secretariat will prepare a detailed programme of the session, which will be made available on the first day of the session.

# Item 3 Ways and means of enhancing the utilization of trade preferences by developing countries, in particular LDCs, as well as further ways of expanding preferences

6. This item will serve to revitalize the debate on GSP and other unilateral trade preferences and their role in the new trading environment. The Commission session provides an opportunity to explore new major policy initiatives to enhance preference schemes. Initiatives may include special measures for LDCs, enhanced burden sharing, development-friendly operation of preferential schemes, harmonization of preferential rules of origin, and the search for a new concept of special and differential treatment for developing countries.

7. This item will also provide the opportunity to discuss strengthening and reorientation of technical cooperation in order to place greater focus on enabling LDCs to make better use of GSP preferences, while adapting technical cooperation for more advanced developing countries to their changing needs.

Item 4 Scope for expanding exports of developing countries in specific services sectors through all GATS modes of supply, taking into account their interrelationship, the role of information technology and of new business practices

8. This item will permit an examination of opportunities and challenges for developing countries in expanding trade in services in the post-Uruguay Round environment. Sectors where some developing countries have created export niches may provide an indication of export opportunities for other developing countries. Some of these sectors have been identified in the report, particularly those which lend themselves to supply through cross-border electronic commerce. Furthermore, this item will permit an examination of the interrelationships amongst the modes of supply of services, taking into account the impact of new technologies. The report draws upon the experience of the expert meetings convened to examine particular service sectors.

9. At the same time, attention has to be drawn to the obstacles that can hinder export expansion, such as visa regulations, licensing and qualification requirements and technical standards, and supply-side constraints which still prevent many developing countries from taking advantage of new market opportunities. Finally, this item will provide the opportunity to examine export strategies and the scope of future initiatives at the national, regional and multilateral levels.

# Item 5 Reports of the subsidiary bodies of the Commission

10. In accordance with paragraph 114 of "A Partnership for Growth and Development" (TD/378), subsidiary bodies should report technical matters discussed at the expert level to the parent Commission, which may transmit them to the Board as appropriate.
