Item 3: Best practices and policy options in the promotion of SME-TNC business linkages

3. The Commission on Enterprise, Business Facilitation and Development agreed at its ninth session (Geneva, 22–25 February 2005) that the establishment of business linkages between small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) on the one hand and transnational corporations (TNCs) on the other represents an emerging opportunity to reap the potential benefits of global trade. These linkages may represent one of the best ways for SMEs to enhance their competitiveness by accessing a set of critical missing assets, such as access to international markets, finance, technology, management skills and specialized knowledge.

4. Host Governments in developing countries have an essential role to play in ensuring that mutually beneficial linkages are established and that the positive impact of foreign direct investment (FDI) on local productive capacities is enhanced. In this respect, the Expert Meeting will identify effective policies for the promotion and implementation of business linkages. Experts will also discuss a checklist of principles based on best practices to encourage the replication of successful programmes for the benefit of interested Governments, TNCs and SME support institutions.

5. On the basis of the outcome of the Meeting, the UNCTAD secretariat will complete a checklist of key success factors in setting up and sequencing the implementation of a business linkage programme. It should complement earlier UNCTAD work that focused on policy formulation and analysis, and facilitate demand for technical cooperation in this area.

6. Presentations by experts will contribute to a better understanding of the drivers of TNC-SME linkages programmes and suggest the implications for policy formulation and development assistance. Based on successful experiences, participants from both the public and the private sector will also highlight how Governments can introduce business linkages programmes involving the active and voluntary participation of TNCs.

7. To facilitate the discussion, the UNCTAD secretariat has prepared an issues note. In addition, experts are encouraged to prepare brief papers on the subject under discussion. These papers will be made available at the meeting in the form and language in which they are received. The Expert Meeting will benefit from the findings of UNCTAD's survey on "Best practices in the promotion of business linkages from a policy perspective" and from the lessons learned from UNCTAD's technical assistance projects in this area.
