Review of evidence in 2010



- Includes Defra commissioned research by PwC/CDP and CDSB
- Published research by IEMA,OECD, and the EU
- Report examines the relationship between reporting and emission reductions
- **Findings:** Measuring and reporting helps embed sustainability in an organisation but indirect link between reporting and reducing emissions
- Benefits to businesses from reporting
- Significant and growing interest from investors
- Need for consistency in reporting frameworks

Regulation vs Voluntary reporting



- Consultation held in summer 2011 on 4 options
- 2018 responses; 208 companies
- 73% of companies favoured the introduction of regulation on GHG reporting
- 56% of trade associations favoured voluntary
- In favour: increase the consistency/quality of reports
- Against: concerns on regulatory burden/cost of regulation
- Improved data on costs and benefits provided by companies and trade associations during consultation

What respondents thought should be reported



- Scope 1 and 2
- Financial control
- Specify an intensity ratio
- Specify a base year
- Report if the base year has been re-calculated
- Other issues: narrative explanation; note of methods/tools used
- **Next steps**: announcement before end of March on whether the Government will introduce regulations
