II. Annotations to the provisional agenda

1. The provisional agenda of the sixty-third session of the Trade and Development Board was approved at the meeting of the Extended Bureau of the Board held on 23 September 2016.¹

Item 1 Procedural matters:

(a) Election of officers

2. The rules of procedure of the Trade and Development Board are contained in documents TD/B/16/Rev.4 and Corr.1.

3. In accordance with rules 18 and 19 of the rules of procedure, the Bureau of the Board consists of 12 members: the President, 10 Vice-Presidents and the Rapporteur, i.e. four members from list A (Africa/Asia), four from list B, two from list C and two from list D, as referred to in the annex to General Assembly resolution 1995 (XIX), as amended.

4. In accordance with the cycle of rotation that has been in operation since the ninth session of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development, the President of the Board for the sixty-third session will be a representative of one of the States in list A (Africa) and the Rapporteur will be a representative of one of the States in list C. The 10 Vice-Presidents will therefore be as follows: three from list A (Africa/Asia); four from list B; one from list C; and two from list D.

(b) Adoption of the agenda and organization of the work of the session

Agenda

5. The provisional agenda for the session is reproduced in chapter I above.

Organization of work

6. In order to accommodate the suggestions made by delegations, meetings of the session of the Board have been organized in such a way as to ensure that no two meetings will take place simultaneously. They have been designed with a view to ensuring effective participation by delegations, particularly small delegations, and also to making the most efficient use of the conference resources of the United Nations.

(c) Adoption of the report on credentials

7. In accordance with rule 17.2 of the rules of procedure, the Bureau of the Board will examine the credentials and submit its report to the Board.

(d) Provisional agenda for the sixty-fourth session of the Board

8. The draft provisional agenda for the sixty-fourth session of the Board will be prepared by the secretariat. The Board may wish to refer consideration of this item to the consultations of the President of the Board.

Item 2 Evolution of the international trading system and its trends from a development perspective

9. Paragraph 38 (m) of the Nairobi Maafikiano states that UNCTAD should "continue to monitor and assess the evolution of the international trading system and its trends from a development perspective, with particular attention to its potential contribution to the Sustainable Development Goals".

10. In response to that mandate, under the agenda item, the Trade and Development Board will first be presented with a general overview of the recent trends in international trade and trade policy for both goods and services. The Board will discuss the growing significance of services sector in global trade, its capacity to resist economic downturns and its growing competitiveness. The Board will also discuss the increasing importance of the services economy in developing and least developed countries from economic, social welfare and development perspectives. Additionally, the Board will take a closer look at the recent World Trade Organization services waiver and aim at kick-starting a discussion on possibilities for establishing a permanent system of preferences for services trade for least developed countries.

11. The Board will also discuss agricultural commodity value chains and what the effects of market concentration are on farmers and producing countries. It will discuss market concentration patterns and the distribution of values among stakeholders in agricultural commodities global value chains. Most particularly, the Board will examine these issues in the cocoa industry where the situation of small and dispersed farmers is of particular concern, as their already weak position in the value chain continues to be undermined by well-integrated stakeholders, including traders, processors and manufacturers of chocolate products. As a result, the former have very limited room to negotiate realistic prices for their output that would cover their production costs and leave them with a margin for a decent livelihood. The situation, which prevails not only in the cocoa global value chain but also in that of other agricultural commodities such coffee, grains and sugar, could contribute to undermining the sustainability of farming businesses unless concerted actions are taken to address it. The Board will therefore deliberate upon policy options to support small stakeholders in agricultural commodity value chains, especially farmers, in the face of increasing concentration along value chains. This is crucial to achieve some of the Sustainable Development Goals with their commitment to "leave no one behind".

Item 3 Investment for development

12. There is consensus on the critical role of private investment in contributing to achieving sustainable development objectives. In particular, private investment can have an important impact on economic development by enhancing productive capacity, creating jobs and expertise, contributing to diversification and facilitating the integration of economies into global value chains. The catalytic potential of private investment makes

policy intervention for attracting increased investment a priority. To date, most policy interventions for attracting investment have focused on investment promotion. Hence, about half of the policy measures implemented between 2010 and 2015 to attract investment sought to promote a location as an investment destination. At the international level, the investment facilitation dimension is either absent or weak in the overwhelming majority of international investment agreements. Therefore, for an investment attraction strategy to be effective, investment promotion needs to go hand in hand with investment facilitation efforts, both at the national and international policy levels.

13. To that end, UNCTAD formulated a global action menu for investment facilitation. The menu is based on the organization's experience with investment promotion and facilitation efforts worldwide over decades and on the UNCTAD Investment Policy Framework for Sustainable Development, as well as its action plan for investing in the Sustainable Development Goals. The current version incorporates feedback and lessons learned from multi-stakeholder consultations and intergovernmental processes, including strong support from policymakers worldwide, as received at the fifth World Investment Forum, organized as part of the fourteenth session of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development, held in Nairobi in July 2016, as well as many other forums.

14. The session will consist of two parts. The global action menu for investment facilitation (updated from chapter 3 of the *World Investment Report 2016*) will be reviewed during the discussion of the first panel. Panellists will discuss the national and international policy dimensions of investment facilitation, including how to fill in the policy gaps. The second panel will then present perspectives on best practice in the area of investment facilitation, as well as elaborate on the nexus between investment facilitation, business linkages and the development of small and medium-sized enterprises. The presentations of the panels will be followed by interactive dialogues among participants and panellists on the topic, with national, regional and interregional perspectives.

Documentation

UNCTAD contributions to the implementation of and follow-up to the outcomes of the major United Nations conferences and summits in the economic and social fields

15. In its resolution 57/270 B, the General Assembly stressed the need to make maximum use of existing United Nations mechanisms for the purpose of reviewing the implementation of commitments made within the United Nations system in key areas of development. In this regard, it invited the Trade and Development Board to contribute, within its mandate, to the implementation and review of the progress made in the implementation of the outcomes of the major United Nations conferences and summits, under its relevant agenda items.

16. Paragraphs 18 and 18 (n) of the Doha Mandate state that "UNCTAD should continue to work within its mandate – through its three pillars, delivering meaningful results, utilizing available resources, while enhancing synergies and promoting complementarities with the work of other organizations. In this regard, UNCTAD should... implement and follow up, as appropriate, relevant outcomes from global conferences and summits on development."

17. Similarly, paragraph 10 of the Nairobi Maafikiano states that "UNCTAD should contribute to the implementation of and follow-up to the outcomes of relevant global conferences, including the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, the Addis Ababa Action Agenda and, as appropriate, the Paris Agreement under the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, among other relevant international agreements and outcomes."

18. The Board is expected to respond to the request addressed to it by the General Assembly in paragraph 27 (a) of resolution 57/270 B on the basis of a note prepared by the UNCTAD secretariat.

19. As at previous sessions, the Board at its sixty-third session will deliberate on progress in implementation of the Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the Decade 2011–2020 (Istanbul Programme of Action) in the areas of the mandates and competence of UNCTAD. The Board's consideration of the agenda item will be based on the fifth progress report prepared by the secretariat, in accordance with paragraphs 153 and 156 of the Istanbul Programme of Action. The report provides comprehensive information on the UNCTAD contribution to the implementation of the Istanbul Programme of Action in 2015, together with preliminary conclusions and the way forward.

20. (b) Report on UNCTAD assistance to the Palestinian people

As in previous years, the UNCTAD report on assistance to the Palestinian people 21. analyses recent economic developments in the Occupied Palestinian Territory. The report draws attention to the continuing blockade on Gaza and the worsening socioeconomic conditions. It highlights the stagnation of per capita income, which is mainly attributed to the decline in foreign aid and the withholding by Israel of Palestinian tax revenue in 2015. It also highlights the adverse effects of the continuing leakage of Palestinian fiscal resources, the expansion of settlements and the inability of Palestinian producers to import essential production inputs. The report analyses the high economic costs of occupation and asserts that, without occupation, gross domestic product of the Occupied Palestinian Territory could be twice its current size. It calls for the establishment of a United Nations framework to assess such costs, and maintains that this would be an essential step for placing the Palestinian economy on a path of sustainable development and achieving a lasting peace in the Middle East. Finally, the report updates the Board on recent UNCTAD technical cooperation activities in the Occupied Palestinian Territory and the challenges the secretariat faces in implementing those activities.
