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THE DEBT MANAGEMENT–DMFAS PROGRAMME



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1. INTRODUCTION

UNCTAD's Debt Management–DMFAS Programme aims to help developing countries and countries with economies in transition build their capacity to manage debt effectively. By working directly with countries and with international and regional organizations involved in debt management, the Programme tries to identify best debt management practices and then helps countries build the capacity to adopt them. Best practices are shared with countries through international and regional conferences and seminars and through country-specific technical cooperation projects.

Technical cooperation project activities cover the installation of the Programme's specialized debt management software, the Debt Management Financial and Analysis System (DMFAS), as well as training and assistance in its effective use. In particular, the system enables debt officers to establish a complete and up-to-date debt database and to provide timely and accurate debt statistics. Project activities also cover maintenance and system support, advice on institutional and procedural issues, participation of government officials in DMFAS training seminars in Geneva (or at a regional location), study tours for government officials to other DMFAS user countries, and assistance in debt analysis and in the development of debt management strategies. An important feature of the DMFAS software is its interface with the World Bank's Debt Sustainability Model Plus (DSM+), an analytical tool designed to assist country officials in formulating a debt strategy – incorporating debt relief or new borrowing alternatives – that is both cost-effective and sustainable, and consistent with long-term macroeconomic policies.

At the end of December 2004, the Programme had projects with 62 low- and middle-income countries, including 91 institutions, and projects with two new countries, including three new institutions about to start. The debt stock of these countries accounts for more than US\$ 500 billion of outstanding public and public-guaranteed long-term debt, an amount that represents approximately 40 per cent of the total long-term debt of all developing countries.¹

The Programme's role in helping countries strengthen their debt management can be seen against the background of UN resolutions on debt, the Millennium Development Goals and the Monterrey Consensus, which highlight the importance of international cooperation in dealing with debt issues. In December 2004, the United Nations General Assembly adopted a new resolution on external debt crisis and development (A/C.2/59/L.53), *welcoming the efforts, and further calling upon the international community to support institutional capacity-building in developing countries and countries with economies in transition for the management of financial assets and liabilities and to enhance sustainable debt management as an integral part of national development strategies* (para. 16). It also reinforced its invitation to *UNCTAD, IMF and the World Bank, in cooperation with the regional banks, regional commissions and multilateral institutions, to study the possibility of creating a consultative group on external debt management aimed at developing best practices and strengthening the institutional capacity of developing countries in debt management, taking into account work that has already been done* (para. 17).

The present report reviews the activities undertaken by the Debt Management–DMFAS Programme in 2004. During the year, the Programme successfully implemented the new version of its debt management and analysis software, DMFAS version 5.3. Released at the end of 2003, it had already been installed and made operational in 12 DMFAS countries and 16 institutions by the end of 2004. This new version of the software incorporates important functional and technological improvements in response to client requests and in line with international standards and best practices.

The activities and the funding of the Programme are reviewed annually by the DMFAS Advisory Group, which is composed of technical representatives of interested UNCTAD member States, including donors and beneficiaries, as well as the UNCTAD secretariat. More detailed information about the Programme and activities in each of its client countries can be found in the Annex.



2. DMFAS COUNTRY ACTIVITIES

Capacity building in debt management

The role of the Programme has always been to provide debt offices with a standard system. Implementation of the system in the country, however, is specific to each country project and is part of how the Programme helps countries build their capacity in debt management (see box 1).

Box 1. Debt management capacity building



Capacity building in debt management can be compared to the construction of a “pyramid”. As depicted in the above diagram, there are three visible corners at the base, namely *Structure*, *Staffing* and *Systems*. These are the cornerstones for capacity building. At the top of the pyramid is *Strategy*.

In order to develop a debt strategy, one has first to establish a “Debt database”, produce relevant ‘Statistics’ and, finally, undertake relevant ‘Analysis’. These three layers are the building blocks towards strategy and policy-making.

Building capacity in sovereign debt management can take several years, and country situations vary widely. They are shaped by the type of financing available to the Government (i.e. bilateral and multilateral official loans, private loans, capital markets, financial derivatives), the exchange rate regime, the quality of macroeconomic and regulatory policies, the overall institutional capacity, the country’s credit standing and its objectives for public debt management. Thus, there cannot be a set of binding practices or mandatory standards or codes. It is important to emphasize that the pyramid can be built in different ways. However, it will need the cornerstones and building blocks referred to above.

Number of user countries and institutions

An overview of the status of DMFAS country project implementation is provided in table 1. After increasing regularly over the previous 10 years, with an average of approximately five new countries joining the Programme each year, the number of countries using the DMFAS system remained stable during 2004. However, the number of user institutions using DMFAS within existing countries has continued to rise. For the biennium 2004–2005, a target number of 90 user institutions had been set against a baseline of 85. At the end of December 2004, the biennium target had been surpassed, with 91 institutions using DMFAS. Furthermore, negotiations were being undertaken for four new countries – Algeria (Ministry of Finance), Cambodia (Ministry of Finance), Comoros and the Democratic Republic of the Congo (Debt Management Office).

The Programme currently manages a portfolio of around 40 active projects. In addition to projects for new countries and institutions, follow-up projects were being prepared for a large number of current user institutions/countries, including Bangladesh (Ministry of Finance), Costa Rica (Ministry of Finance), Côte d'Ivoire (Ministry of Finance), Ecuador (Ministry of Finance and Central Bank), Honduras (Ministry of Finance and Central Bank), Mauritania (Ministry of Finance), Nicaragua (Ministry of Finance and Central Bank), Paraguay (Ministry of Finance), the Republic of Moldova (Ministry of Finance and Central Bank), Romania (Ministry of Finance and Central Bank), Sao Tome and Principe (Central Bank), Sudan (Central Bank) and Venezuela (Ministry of Finance).

Location of debt management offices

At the end of 2004, the DMFAS software was installed in debt offices in 91 institutions in 62 countries. These offices are usually found in the ministry of finance or the central bank (or in some cases the ministry of planning, local government, or an export-import bank). They are in 40 low-income country institutions (28 countries), 35 lower-middle-income country institutions (25 countries) and 16 upper-middle-income country institutions (nine countries). The matrix below provides the location breakdown of DMFAS installations according to country income group and institution type.

The exact location of the debt office within the institution itself often varies. In central banks, for example, the debt office can be situated in the Balance-of-Payments/Statistics Division (Egypt, Romania) or in the International Department (Dominican Republic). In ministries of finance, the debt office is usually part of the Public Debt or Credit Department, but can also be part of the Treasury Department (Philippines), the External Relations Division (Bangladesh) or the Budget Administration Division (Indonesia). In certain cases it is located in the Accountant General's Office (Zimbabwe). The mandate of each debt office can therefore differ from one office to another according to its organizational location.

² Economies are divided among income groups according to 2003 gross national income (GNI) per capita, calculated using the World Bank Atlas method. The groups are: low-income, \$765 or less; lower-middle-income, \$766–3,035; upper-middle-income, \$3,036–9,385; and high-income, \$9,386 or more. Classification by income does not necessarily reflect development status.

Similarly, different institutional combinations can be found with regard to debt recording: sometimes this takes place in both the ministry of finance and the central bank, with each having different database access rights for this purpose. In other installations, one of the two institutions may only have reading access (i.e. no recording).

In 21 countries, the system is set up in both the ministry of finance and the central bank, and the number of countries where these two institutions are electronically linked through DMFAS (on a wide area network) is increasing. See tables 1 and 2.

Operational status of DMFAS implementation

Table 2 provides an overview of the operational status of DMFAS installations around the world. As can be seen, the new version of DMFAS (5.3) has already been installed in 17 institutions and in 12 DMFAS user countries. DMFAS 5.2 is installed in 40 countries and in 60 institutions. Three institutions are still using DMFAS version 4.1 Plus (Central African Republic, Egypt and Ethiopia); however, one of these (Egypt) has now converted to DMFAS 5.2 and continues to only use 4.1 in parallel for certain loans.

At the end of 2004, DMFAS was not operational in 13 of the institutions in which it was installed, and in 10 of the countries in which it was installed. Six of these countries were experiencing operational difficulties owing to institutional, staffing, political or technical problems (Bangladesh, Central African Republic, Guinea-Bissau, Kazakhstan, Sao Tome and Principe, and Uzbekistan). Four others were using their own system (Colombia, Peru, Senegal and Ukraine).

As can be seen from the table, the Programme attempts to monitor the extent to which the system is being used by the institutions concerned. The following stages have been differentiated:

- Stage 0** System installed, but not used
- Stage 1** Database regularly kept up to date and validated
- Stage 2** System used for monitoring and internal reporting
- Stage 3** System used for the publication of statistical bulletins and/or other periodical publications
- Stage 4** Staff have received (basic or advanced) training in the use of DSM+ for debt analysis

In some cases, the system has been installed, but the database is still being developed. Where this is the case, Stage 1 (with comments) has been indicated.

These stages correspond to the various levels of the pyramid concept outlined in box 1 and its three broad categories – debt data, debt statistics and analysis.

The performance indicators related to the use of the system have to be integrated into a broader framework in order to evaluate the overall performance or capacity of an institution and/or country in the area of debt management. One should therefore also look at the structure and staffing of the debt offices, as well as other relevant elements, for example the existence and regular meeting of a debt strategy committee.

Integrated financial management systems and DMFAS

The trend for countries to link DMFAS with their own integrated financial management systems (IFMS) is expected to continue. One of the most important features here is the support that the Programme can provide on the operational level of debt management (mainly to debt offices located in ministries of finance). By facilitating the automated preparation of payment orders and disbursement operations, the system allows for transparency in the servicing of debt obligations and in the execution of

the budget. Through electronic links covering the full cycle of the debt service operation, DMFAS helps to ensure the safe flow of operations through cash management in the treasury module, execution of the budget in the budget module and registration of transactions in the accounting module. This process eliminates manual handling during the operational process of repaying public debt, which has always been one of the key areas of risk.

DMFAS user countries building or planning to build integrated systems are chiefly located in Latin America, namely Argentina, Bolivia, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Panama and Paraguay. Other countries that have built links or are planning to do so are located in Africa: Angola, Burkina Faso, Chad and Côte d'Ivoire. Concerning the building of such systems, the Debt Management–DMFAS Programme focuses mainly on providing advisory services to the national teams through workshops or by providing technical assistance in building and maintaining the relevant links.

Scope of country projects

DMFAS country projects encompass a wide range of activities beyond installation of the DMFAS software and training in its use. Most projects assist Governments in the development of appropriate legal, administrative, technical and organizational environments in which the system operates. Other areas of assistance may include database building, the defining of external borrowing strategies, the establishing of appropriate communication and information flows, financing techniques, credit analysis and debt renegotiation. The Programme also organizes workshops and study tours, and participates in national, regional and training seminars.

Consultants and/or central staff carry out the installation of DMFAS and any relevant training during missions to the country institution. In certain projects, advisers are fielded for longer periods to provide continued on-site support and debt management advisory services. A list of country project activity missions undertaken during the reporting period is provided in table 3.

3. DMFAS AND HIPC

The Debt Management–DMFAS Programme is cooperating with 21 out of the 38 countries considered under the Enhanced HIPC Initiative. The major element of this cooperation is the implementation of the DMFAS software, which assists debt managers in establishing and maintaining an accurate, up-to-date and complete debt database, in providing statistical reports and in undertaking debt analysis.

Among the 15 countries that had reached their completion point by the end of 2004, eight (Bolivia, Burkina Faso, Ethiopia, Madagascar, Mauritania, Nicaragua, Senegal and Uganda) are active users of the DMFAS system. The support provided by the Programme will help these countries in tracking the full relief now obtained under the Initiative. Of the 12 countries that were at decision point by the end of 2004, DMFAS was collaborating with seven of them (Chad, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Guinea-Bissau, Honduras, Rwanda, Sao Tome and Principe, and Zambia). The majority have now centralized and computerized their debt portfolio information. For two of these countries (Democratic Republic of the Congo, and Sao Tome and Principe), DMFAS had new projects in the pipeline. The support provided by the Programme will help those countries in tracking the interim relief obtained from the participating creditors. As at the end of 2004, 11 countries remained to be considered under the Initiative and DMFAS had provided training in debt management to six of them. In three of these (Congo, Sudan and Togo), training activities were actually reinforced in 2004 as they strove to reach decision point. By the end of the year, the Programme was negotiating the start of activities in one additional HIPC country (Comoros).

As in previous years, the Programme's support for HIPCs in 2004 increasingly focused on capacity building in the area of debt statistics and debt strategy issues with the objective of empowering

debt offices to play an active role under the HIPC Initiative, particularly by encouraging their participation in national Debt Committees. General capacities in these areas are still relatively weak and the Programme's interventions were aimed at ensuring that debt offices were fully aware of the amounts of relief obtained or still to be obtained from the participating creditors and understood the financial and macroeconomic principles involved under the debt relief initiative. The release of DMFAS version 5.3 will address these countries' needs in the area of reporting and, through the new classification introduced in version 5.3, ensure that their reports follow international standards. The training curriculum that the Programme has developed in the area of debt statistics will also ensure that the requisite capacities in this area are strengthened.

The importance of a full automatization of the HIPCs' debt management system has been fully recognized by the Bretton Wood institutions as this has become in some cases a trigger point for reaching the completion point under the Initiative. Recently, projects funded by the World Bank have increasingly provided financing for DMFAS technical assistance projects in HIPCs.

The Debt Management–DMFAS Programme's assistance to HIPCs is also coordinated in line with World Bank and IMF recommendations in the field of external debt management in HIPCs. Through the Programme's annual visit to these institutions' headquarters, through participation in DMFAS advisory group meetings and through regular meetings held at regional workshops, the Programme participates in improving the coordination among the providers of technical assistance in debt management to HIPCs. The Programme is also keenly following the latest developments within the Bretton Woods institutions regarding introducing improved approaches in the area of analysing debt sustainability in low-income countries.

In collaboration with Pôle-Dette, which has 15 HIPCs among its 16 member countries, the Debt Management–DMFAS Programme also provides regional assistance through the organization of joint workshops benefiting the sub-Saharan HIPCs. During the year, the Programme continued to cooperate with Pôle-Dette regarding the idea of setting up a regional DMFAS support unit at Pôle-Dette's headquarters in Yaounde, Camaroon. The final approval for this initiative was obtained in November 2004 from the Banque des Etats de l'Afrique Centrale (BEAC), and it is expected that an official cooperation agreement will be signed in early 2005. This would allow for the implementation of a DMFAS regional support unit by the end of 2005.

In 2004, participants from four HIPC countries were also trained in the use of DSM+ through regional workshops organized in collaboration with MEFMI in Namibia. The new version of DSM+ developed in coordination with the World Bank (see section on Analysis) is a major upgrade of the analytical tool. It incorporates domestic debt and budget information in order to improve the development of portfolio reviews, debt strategies and debt/fiscal sustainability analysis in the context of public debt, and in particular, to support the analytical work of HIPC countries.

4. SYSTEMS

Distribution

Topping the list of the accomplishments in the systems area for the year was the distribution of the new version of DMFAS, 5.3 (officially released on 31 December 2003) and version patches to 12 countries (or 16 institutions), namely Bolivia (Ministry of Finance and Central Bank), Burkina Faso (Ministry of Finance), Chile (Central Bank), Congo (Ministry of Finance), Dominican Republic (Ministry of Finance), Indonesia (Central Bank), Panama (Ministry of Economy), Paraguay (Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Planning and Central Bank), Syrian Arab Republic (Central Bank), Togo (Ministry of Finance), Trinidad and Tobago (Ministry of Finance and Central Bank) and Uganda (Ministry of Finance). It is worth noting that the DMFAS 5.3 installation in the Syrian Arab Republic was also the first installation of an Arabic version of the system. In the case of Paraguay, 5.3 is physically only installed on the Ministry of Finance server with the Ministry of Planning and Central Bank have reading access to it via their workstations.

As outlined in the previous Annual Report (2003), DMFAS 5.3 gives increased emphasis to capital market instruments through its enhanced bonds module. In addition, it contains new functional features for reporting and producing statistics, processing local government debt, managing revolving credit, capitalizing interest and handling Asian Development Fund loans. It also features a revised classification and coding system for debt instruments – a revision that significantly simplifies compliance with international standards for the production of debt statistics. New technical features include a new security password management function, which enables sets (e.g. loans, grants, bonds) to be assigned for exclusive groups of users. Also included is a new feature for exporting loan-by-loan data to the Debt Sustainability Model (DSM+).

In March, the Programme organized a training workshop in Geneva for current and future functional and technical trainers to learn about the new version's functional and technical features.

In addition to the installation of DMFAS 5.3, during the year nine other countries (and 13 institutions) were updated to the consolidated version of DMFAS 5.2.0.50 (or higher).³ These were Côte d'Ivoire (Ministry of Finance), Ecuador (Ministry of Finance and Central Bank), Madagascar (Central Bank), Nicaragua (Ministry of Finance and Central Bank), Philippines (Ministry of Finance), Uganda (Central Bank), Venezuela (Ministry of Finance), Zambia (Ministry of Finance and Central Bank) and Zimbabwe (Ministry of Finance and Central Bank). This brought the total of countries possessing the latest version of DMFAS 5.2 by the end of 2004 to 29 (or 37 institutions). Countries were encouraged to upgrade to 5.2.0.50 in order to benefit from the bug fixes and enhancements it contains and facilitates system and helpdesk maintenance. Its installation also greatly facilitates upgrade to version 5.3.

One country database (Burkina Faso) was converted to euro (i.e. loans with European currency were converted to euro). This brings the number of countries implementing the euro currency to 20, namely Angola, Argentina, Bolivia (two institutions), Burkina Faso, Burundi, Ecuador, Egypt, Guatemala, Honduras, Jordan, Lebanon, Lithuania, Nicaragua (two institutions), Panama, Romania (two institutions), Togo, Uganda (two institutions), Venezuela, Viet Nam (Ministry of Finance) and Zimbabwe (Central Bank). It should be pointed out that relatively new clients such as Chile, Djibouti, Gabon, Indonesia (Central Bank), Madagascar and the Palestinian Authority, were entering the euro loans directly without having to undergo a euro conversion.

Other activities of the Programme's Systems Group included active participation in needs assessments missions (Cuba, Indonesia, Paraguay and Venezuela), in data migration from a client debt system to DMFAS (Indonesia), and in studies as well as implementation of links of client financial systems to DMFAS (Bolivia, Dominican Republic and Honduras).

Development

Version 5.3

Systems development work during the year concentrated mainly on further defining and analysing the user requirements for version 5.3, particularly in the areas of new reporting and statistics, security and handling of participants (syndicated loans). Progress was also made in the programming of the enhancements, and by the end of the year the new functionalities for ADF loans, handling of participants, security and part of the reporting were being finalized and tested in Geneva.

Version 6.0

The Programme's long-term plan is to develop a major new version of the DMFAS, version 6, which will be the first web version of the system and will involve a complete redesign of the system architecture. During the year some decisions were taken particularly in relation to the proposal to outsource part of the programming of the new version. In this connection, it was decided to develop a

prototype using new technology. Part of the prototype was finished and presented to the management during the period with excellent results and with the possibility of obtaining preliminary conclusions that will be presented in the next Advisory Group meeting in June 2005.

Support and maintenance

Extensive support in using the DMFAS system, including assistance and advice on a wide range of functional and technical issues, was made available by the Helpdesk to all DMFAS client countries and institutions throughout the year. This support was given through the fielding of technical missions, through the sending of programs and instructions by CD, e-mail, telephone and fax, and through the UNCTAD FTP server. Where applicable, client databases were also sent by clients and installed in Geneva to facilitate the resolution of queries and problems.

Altogether, the Helpdesk received a total of 602 client requests during the year. Of those, by the end of the year, 397 had been resolved, nine were waiting user action, 20 were marked for future versions, 18 were for testing, 74 were in process and 84 were still awaiting action from the Helpdesk. Table 3 shows the Helpdesk enquiries by country for 2004.

5. DEBT ANALYSIS

Capacity building in debt analysis

The Debt Management–DMFAS Programme has continued strengthening the analytical capacity of debt management offices. Although capacity building is mainly directed at improving the analytical skills within the debt office, it is also directed at improving the office’s organizational structure to enable it to respond more efficiently in its analytical work. The strengthening of debt managers’ analytical capabilities is part of an integrated effort to improve their capacity in the decision-making process.

The strengthening of countries’ analytical capacity to develop comprehensive debt strategies, however, is a long and complex process. The organization of workshops for training in this area therefore needs the support of the national authorities. The strengthening of countries’ analytical skills in debt management should be part of an integrated effort in the training of their technical staff.

The Programme takes a “bottom-up” approach in providing training in debt analysis. It provides training to DMO technical staff and balance-of-payments analysts, as well as training to analysts in the preparation and formulation of comprehensive debt strategies using the World Bank/UNCTAD’s Debt Sustainability Model (DSM+). Training normally includes participants from all the institutions involved in debt management.

DMOs, in particular those located in ministries of finance, are showing concrete improvements in their analytical skills as a result of the Programme’s technical assistance, as well as an increased awareness of the need for, and importance of, improving their debt analysis skills. Certain debt management offices are even incorporating analytical units into their organizational structure, more specifically dedicated to this area of work.

National and regional workshops

Each country’s training needs are evaluated on a case-by-case basis, depending on the country’s needs and demands, and DMFAS country project documents take these into account accordingly. Training can include training in debt portfolio review, conceptual analysis for the development and formulation of debt strategies, and the preparation of debt sustainability analysis. It is delivered through national as well as regional workshops.

In 2004, the Programme undertook country-specific training missions in debt strategy formulation and debt sustainability analysis in four countries: Sudan, Viet Nam, Yemen and Zimbabwe. Project managers elaborated future capacity building in debt analysis for 13 countries: Bolivia, Costa Rica, Cuba, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Gabon, Jordan, Mauritania, Nicaragua, Panama, Togo and Yemen.

Representatives of the Programme also participated in a national joint workshop sponsored by the Macroeconomic and Financial Management Institute of Eastern and Southern Africa (MEFMI), which took place in Zimbabwe from 3 to 14 May 2004. The purpose of the workshop was to prepare Debt Sustainability Analysis with the participation of national experts in the various areas of debt management using country information. The resource persons presented the methodology for the development of debt strategies in a macroeconomic framework, and provided training in the use of DSM+ for the preparation of debt sustainability analysis.

A regional workshop was organized by MEFMI, with the participation of the World Bank, UNCTAD and Comsec, in Namibia from 25 to 29 October 2004. Its main objective was training in the use of DSM+ as the analytical tool for the development of debt strategies in a macroeconomic framework, and the preparation of debt sustainability analysis. A basic presentation of DSM+ features was also included in a training seminar organized with Pôle-Dette in Burkina Faso from 13 to 18 September 2004.

The partner institutions have agreed to continue coordinating their efforts for future activities at the regional level, concentrating their attention on training for trainers. However, it was recommended that national workshops for the preparation of debt strategies with country specific information also be organized with the inclusion of more national participants.

Collaboration with the World Bank

As part of the annual missions to Washington, DC, representatives of the Debt Management–DMFAS Programme visited certain international organizations in April 2004, in particular the World Bank, in order to continue coordinating capacity-building activities. The agenda of the meetings included the presentation of the annual status report of the Programme for 2003, including DSM+, future training within the DMFAS capacity-building programme, and the continuation of support by the World Bank to DSM+.

The coordination of capacity-building activities with partner institutions, in particular with the World Bank, has been more active with the detachment of a central team staff to Washington. It has allowed the Programme to better coordinate its technical cooperation activities with the various departments involved in debt management within the Bank, such as the Treasury Department and the new Debt Department. In addition to collaboration regarding DSM+ and debt analysis, for example, the Programme helps countries provide information to the Bank's Debtor Reporting System (DRS) by helping them compile debt statistics using one of the features of DMFAS in its electronic reporting. It sometimes participates in joint missions to DMFAS countries and also becomes involved in discussions with country operations and with the country management officers for the provision of financing for country projects. DMFAS country projects currently being financed by the World Bank include those for Argentina, Bolivia, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Djibouti, Guatemala, the Islamic Republic of Iran, Kazakhstan, Mongolia, Syria, Viet Nam and Yemen.

This new type of working relationship has strengthened the position of the Debt Management–DMFAS Programme in terms of the delivery of capacity building, in particular regarding debt analysis. It is also consolidating the DSM+ as the analytical tool of the DMFAS debt system, enhancing the capacity of the DMFAS Programme to provide more comprehensive debt management and analytical support.

The Debt Management–DMFAS Programme is coordinating the release of the new version (2.3) of DSM+ with the World Bank. This new version will be a major upgrade of the analytical tool and will allow the user to incorporate domestic debt on a loan-by-loan basis as well as budget information. It will also improve the development of portfolio reviews, debt strategies and debt/fiscal sustainability analysis in the context of public debt.

During the year, the Programme participated actively in the enhancement of DSM+ and supported the development and testing of the new version. In line with the DMFAS system's new functionality for recording domestic debt, for example, new features to incorporate information on domestic debt were developed in DSM+. The incorporation of budget/fiscal information in DSM+ will help calculate fiscal financing requirements and fiscal gaps. This will greatly improve the use of DSM+ in the decision-making process for alternative sources of financing and also facilitate fiscal sustainability analysis. The upgraded version of DSM+ incorporates various improvements in the installation of the software, which also include various new worksheets and new reports making it possible to reflect the data of public debt and render it more user-friendly.

Sustainable capacity building in debt analysis

Capacity building in debt analysis is a long-term undertaking, as it requires the DMOs to make concrete changes and improvements to their structure and functional organization, as well as to their staffing, in order to incorporate analytical units more specifically dedicated to this area of work (middle office functions), as explained above.

In order to have a sustainable capacity-building programme in debt analysis, training activities are being integrated in the core components of the country projects. Training in debt analysis will continue to be required as one of the main activities of the DMFAS capacity-building programme in the future. However, the financing allocated for these activities in country projects is small. Given the long-term nature of capacity building, additional resources are constantly being required in order to meet the objectives in this area.

6. TRAINING

Regional training activities

In addition to project-related training, the Debt Management–DMFAS Programme undertakes a number of regional training activities each year. The activities undertaken in 2004 are described below:

Africa

Two workshops were arranged together with the Macroeconomic and Financial Management Institute of Eastern and Southern Africa (MEFMI), one on debt statistics and reporting in Harare, Zimbabwe, in April and the other on domestic debt, in Dar-es-Salaam, United Republic of Tanzania, in September. Ten countries attended each of these workshops.

Together with Pôle-Dette a workshop on the reporting functions of DMFAS version 5.3 was organized in Ougadougou, Burkina Faso, in September. Representatives from eight countries attended this workshop. In addition, Pôle-Dette has approved the technical cooperation agreement proposed to it by UNCTAD. A few minor changes are being made to the agreement before it is sent to Yaoundé, Cameroon, for signature in early 2005 (see also Section on DMFAS and HIPC). Thereafter Pôle-Dette and UNCTAD will jointly seek funding for the proposed activities.

Arab countries

In September ESCWA and UNCTAD arranged a joint debt management workshop for Arab countries in Beirut. The focus of the workshop, which was attended by six countries, including Iraq, was on effective debt management. The institutional set-up of a debt management office was discussed as well as procedures and future capacity-building needs. The participants in the meeting expressed a desire to have the event repeated on a yearly basis.

In March, the Paris Club and UNCTAD jointly arranged a high-level workshop on the rescheduling of debt for the interim Government of Iraq. Both the Minister of Finance and the Governor of the Central Bank attended this meeting, which took place in Beirut. The meeting was also attended by representatives of the Bank of England, the IMF, the Ministry of Finance of Lebanon and the US Treasury.

Training module on debt statistics

In line with the Programme's new modular approach to producing a comprehensive training package of debt management capacity-building materials, a great deal of effort to produce a module for the production of a debt statistical bulletin was made during the year. A draft version of a "Participants' Training Handbook" in debt statistics was prepared by the central team during the first quarter of 2004, and was then presented at a workshop in Geneva (29 March to 2 April), at which it was extensively discussed (in particular the proposed tables) between DMFAS consultants, the DMFAS central team and representatives of the IMF and the World Bank. Subsequently, an abridged version was introduced to four countries belonging to MEFMI that use DMFAS (Angola, Uganda, Zambia and Zimbabwe) during an UNCTAD/MEFMI regional workshop on issues relating to the production of a statistical bulletin, which took place in Harare from 26 to 30 April. The response of the participants was very positive and MEFMI has requested that country-specific workshops on debt statistics also take place in the future.

During the period from May to December the conceptual framework of the Participant's Handbook and the statistical tables were revised. The Participant's Handbook was circulated for comments and several very important inputs were received, especially from the IMF Statistics Department.

The training module in debt statistics includes:

- A Participant's Handbook on the Production of a Debt Statistical Bulletin (conceptual framework, sample tables)
- A Trainer's Guide
- Power point presentations
- Tools to be used in defining a Debt Statistical Bulletin
- Test cases

The module has been used already for the preparation of their debt statistical bulletins by both Indonesia and Togo.

7. DOCUMENTATION, PUBLICATIONS AND WEBSITE

The Debt Management–DMFAS Programme provides its user countries and interested parties with regularly updated information and documentation on the Programme, its system and debt management procedures in general. The documents are distributed directly to users, and in many cases made available on the Programme's website.

Documentation and publications

The Programme produced the following documentation during the year:

The DMFAS Programme Annual Report 2003. The report provides detailed information on the Programme's activities in 2003, including the following: country activities; software development; work in the field of debt statistics and analysis; training; documentation and publications; the World Association of Debt Management Offices; the DMFAS Advisory Group and Trust Fund; and the Programme's financial situation and funding.

The website also gives links to DMFAS user institutions and to sites specialized in debt management.

8. WORLD ASSOCIATION OF DEBT MANAGEMENT OFFICES

The Debt Management–DMFAS Programme, which serves as secretariat to the World Association of Debt Management Offices (WADMO), shared information on debt management with WADMO members throughout the year via regular correspondence and via the WADMO website (www.wadmo.net). A members' area offering information on the association, events and publications has been developed and will be activated in 2005. The Programme also implemented a quarterly reporting procedure for the Steering Committee members.

The Programme helped publish the second issue of the WADMO Journal. The journal is a bilingual (English and French) electronic publication whose objective is to inform members about the association's work and activities; to enable members to exchange experience and information; to present international debt management practices; and to inform members about recent trends in debt management.

At the end of December 2004, WADMO had 42 full members and two associate members. It is currently chaired by the Treasurer of the Philippines.

9. FINANCIAL SITUATION AND FUNDING

After a rather sharp drop in overall country project expenditures in 2003 as compared with 2002, overall expenditures increased slightly in 2004 to give a total of just over US\$ 925,000 as can be seen in table 4, which provides an overview of DMFAS country project expenditures and activities from 2002 to 2004.

A breakdown of these expenditures by source is reflected in table 5, which shows that the downward trend of UNDP managed projects intensified in 2004, with a drop in UNDP expenditures of over 50 per cent. Conversely, projects financed through other sources sharply increased during the year, more than compensating the decrease of expenditures in UNDP managed projects in absolute terms. Hence the slight overall increase in expenditures.

Regarding expenditures for the Programme's central operations, which are charged to the multi-donor trust fund and other bilateral donor trust funds, these increased sharply in 2004, continuing the upward trend of the last few years. This was greatly due to the sharp depreciation of the US dollar vis-à-vis the Swiss Franc. Indeed, while the Programme's budget is expressed in US dollars, the Programme's central staff are paid a fixed amount in Swiss Francs. It is clear that the continuous depreciation of the US dollar since the beginning of 2002 – the year in which the financial plan for the multi-donor trust fund was presented to the donors – has considerably increased the cost of the Programme's central operations as compared with the original financial plans.

Funding received from the UN's Regular Budget is spent on the Programme's central activities. Over the last three years expenditures from UN sources have slightly increased. This increase can also be explained by the depreciation of the US dollar.

Table 7 provides a detailed expenditure overview for the central operations of the Debt Management–DMFAS programme in 2004, which totalled US\$ 3,903,345, up from US\$ 3,203,809 in 2003. All sources of expenditures remained basically unchanged over the last two years, except for bilateral donors, and cost sharing as discussed below.

The resources of the development account that has financed a large part of the capacity- building activities in debt analysis over the last few years are coming to an end. The Programme is therefore pursuing new sources of financing in order to continue with this important capacity-building effort, so as to reach a larger number of countries in need of this technical assistance support. Implementation of technical assistance in this area will slow down if new resources are not available. Given the long-term

nature of the capacity building in analytical work, more financial resources will have to be allocated to the training programme, in particular with emphasis on regional workshops. The Programme has approached donor countries for their support in this area and hopes to have a positive response.

Country project work is supported by a central team of 25 professional and administrative staff based in Geneva. Although the team is partly financed from the UN regular budget and resources available from overheads and other UN accounts, since 1995 it is essentially four bilateral donors (Netherlands, Norway, Sweden and Switzerland) that have provided the main source of financial support for the team. Their total annual contributions have remained practically unchanged at US\$ 1,7 million from 2001 to 2003, while increasing to US\$ 2 million in 2004 (see table 8).

Cost sharing

In the past, country projects included contributions to partly cover the costs of the central operations of the Programme. These contributions (cost-sharing) by countries benefiting from and participating in DMFAS activities have increasingly represented a new source of funding for the Programme. The DMFAS Trust Fund, established by the UNCTAD secretariat on the recommendation of the DMFAS Advisory Group in 2001, has formalized this cost-sharing mechanism and rendered its accountability more transparent.

The cost-sharing mechanism has three components: (a) income from beneficiaries/country projects for specific activities and general support, (b) a one-time DMFAS development contribution made at the time of the first installation of the DMFAS system and (c) a yearly maintenance fee applicable to most current DMFAS user-institutions, which allows user-institutions to benefit from the future upgrades of DMFAS version 5 and from privileged maintenance services provided by the Debt Management–DMFAS Programme’s technical team.

As can be seen in table 7, the second and third of the above-mentioned components of cost sharing significantly dropped from US\$ 485,000 in 2003 to US\$ 146,000 in 2004. The fall is entirely due to the fact that no new countries adopted the DMFAS during 2004, and that therefore no development contributions were made (see table 6.E), whereas in 2003 the development contributions amounted to US\$ 380,000. It was expected that two new user-institutions would contribute US\$ 110,000 during 2004, but the signing of the corresponding project documents was delayed until the beginning of 2005. It is expected that in 2005 this part of cost sharing will increase.

On the other hand, maintenance fees increased by 39% in 2004. Even if maintenance fees are still less important in terms of income than development contributions, they constitute a more reliable kind of income for the Programme.

The promotion of the yearly maintenance fee started in September 2002 after UNCTAD’s senior management had approved its concept. The respective duties and responsibilities of the Debt Management–DMFAS Programme and the user-institutions are described in the maintenance agreement. These were forwarded to all the beneficiary institutions at the beginning of the 2003 for comments and approval. The initial maintenance fee was set at US\$ 5,000 per year per institution.

The number of potential fee-paying institutions – whether financed directly by the beneficiary institutions themselves or through active technical cooperation projects – is estimated to be 61 out of 89. For various historical, contractual or operational reasons, certain institutions⁴ (28 out of 89) will not yet participate in this endeavour, although the number is expected to diminish rapidly over the next two years.

⁴ For instance, certain institutions are implementing DMFAS within the framework of previously agreed upon technical cooperation projects, for which the adoption of the maintenance agreements had not yet been catered for. Other institutions are no longer using previously installed versions of the DMFAS system and are usually awaiting a new project for the system to be made operational again. Other institutions are in countries affected by war or social upheaval.

Although the maintenance agreements were introduced on a voluntary basis, the positive response from the community of user institutions has exceeded the Programme's initial expectations. This response clearly shows the value attached by the beneficiary institutions to the DMFAS system and related services.

At the end of December 2004, 40 institutions had either agreed to, or paid, their yearly maintenance fee or were taking the necessary legal and administrative steps to do so. This figure represents a substantive increase of 13 institutions as compared with December 2003. A further 16 institutions were in an advanced stage of approving the maintenance agreement. The total contributions thus received in 2004 amounted to US\$ 140,000, as compared with US\$ 110,000 in 2003⁵.





FIGURE 2 BILATERAL DONORS' CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE DEBT MANAGEMENT–DMFAS PROGRAMME'S CENTRAL OPERATIONS, 1998–2004
