Introduction: from consumerism to sustainable consumption

- A. Regulating the lifespan expectancy of consumer products and product obsolescence
- B. Broadening the concept of product safety to cover risks of hazards to the environment.

Product lifespan expectancy and obsolescence

- To develop a standardized evaluation method for measuring the lifespan of products and setting sustainability criteria
- To promote certification and consumer information schemes to attest the conformity of the product with such sustainability standards
- To provide for the legal obligation of manufacturers, importers and distributors to guarantee the durability of the product for a fixed period after being made available on the market.
- To provide for the legal obligation of manufacturers, importers and distributors to guarantee the repairability of the product
- To provide adequate information to consumers
- To sanction planned obsolescence
