PART I: The EU - gradual CFP Reform

- > <u>1983-1992</u>: Conservation & government support considered as <u>separate</u> polices.
- <u>2004</u>: Abolition of support for <u>new vessel construction</u>.
- EU Regulation to prevent, deter and eliminate illegal, unreported and unregulated fishing (IUU) entered into force on 1 January 2010.
- 2007 2013: European Fisheries Fund (EFF) : promoting a sustainable balance between resources and the fishing capacity of the EU fishing fleets. Focusing of support for modernisation of fishing vessels mainly on safety, working conditions, hygiene, selectivity and energy efficiency. No increase of the ability of the vessel to catch fish.
- 2014-2020: European Maritime and Fisheries Fund (EMFF) : Operations increasing fishing capacity or the ability to find fish ineligible for public support. Less emphasis on fleet measures and infrastructure works & more emphasis on sustainability, diversification and innovation.
