The main objectives of the statistical training are:

- I. To build statistical capacities of Malawi though training of national statistical experts to compute and interpret country-specific PCI;
- II. To share statistical and methodological as well as computational aspects of the PCI and to expose national statisticians to UNCTAD's Productive Capacities Index (PCI);
- III. To enhance the capacity of Malawian statistical experts to initiate processes to enhance the validity of the results for Malawi;
- IV. To explore how the PCI can be used in national statistics and policy-making processes.
- V. To foster a network of national statisticians who work and exchange on PCI
- VI. To collect feedback for the Statistical and Technical Advisory Group (STAG) of the PCI
