

Building the capacities of Myanmar to upgrade and diversify its fish exports to meet international quality and safety standards

Background

As part of the implementation of a project on building the capacities of selected countries to upgrade and diversify their fish exports, UNCTAD is organizing a training and capacity building workshop in Myanmar from 9 to 11 August 2016.

Building on the policy lessons drawn from recently held workshops in African countries and Cambodia, this workshop will explore ways to upgrade and diversify Myanmar's fisheries exports. The workshop will address regional and global demand for fish, sustainability of supply, and the challenges and opportunities for Myanmar to tap its fisheries resources. It will also focus on international standards and various other requirements of importing markets. It will consider the human and institutional capacities that need to be built to overcome the challenges posed by weak supply capacities and complex international food safety requirements.

The workshop comprises two main segments: technical and policy. Each segment will itself consider four broad topics:

- i. How to sustainably tap into the potential of fisheries exports through diversification and structural transformation of the sector
- ii. The best practices and successful experiences from other developing countries on how to take advantage of growing global demand in fish, including through aquaculture
- iii. The necessary policies and strategies to enhance the role of the fisheries sector in the socioeconomic development of Myanmar
- iv. How to effectively address the challenges of meeting international fish quality and safety standards.

The meeting will also provide UNCTAD with the opportunity to validate and improve its draft manual on *Improving national standards in compliance with international sanitary and phytosanitary standards*. This manual, prepared by UNCTAD, will serve as background document and a basis for discussions.

Myanmar is an LDC that has plenty of trade potential in its fisheries resources. The fisheries sector is currently significant both in terms of domestic consumption and in exports. Nevertheless, international standards related to food safety and food quality continue to present challenges to Myanmar's exporters. Myanmar already successfully exports fisheries products to a number of developed country markets, including in the European Union, however, due to the constant heightening of standards, it is important to appraise how to maintain access to these markets over time.

Workshop goals and participation

Segment I – Technical level sessions

The objective of this segment is to allow an in-depth technical discussion on the problems posed by weak supply capacities and complex international standards. Key participants will be technical people, from both private and public institutions dealing with the fisheries sector, including fishermen, experts in fish products, and exporters. These people will bring practical

and technical knowledge about trade, development policies and international standards pertaining to food quality and safety. Participants will be exposed to the most important challenges, opportunities and potential in fishery exports in Myanmar.

<u>Segment II – Policy level session</u>

This segment will share policy relevant information and increase the understanding of key policymakers on issues related to formulating and implementing diversification policies and export promotion strategies with a focus on the fishery sector of the country. It will bring together a broad range of stakeholders (including representatives from academia, civil society, the private sector and government officials) to discuss the actions necessary to sustainably upgrade and diversify the fish exports of Myanmar, in part through increasing the industry's capacity to meet international standards. The policy level session will also explore ways to implement the UNCTAD manual on improving national standards in compliance with international sanitary and phytosanitary standards.
