It will discuss the success stories concerned with building productive capacities and accelerating structural economic transformation and examine the level of productive capacities of Zambia with implications to national, regional policies as well as international support measures.

This session will examine Zambia's commodity exports' dependence and its national debt crisis, and discuss related challenges and solutions. In the contemporary volatile world, dependence on extractive industries and their export make developing economies vulnerable to international price fluctuations and international demand, making the effective policy making for sustainable development particularly cumbersome. This may cause major imbalances to state budget, in extreme cases, substantially increasing country's indebtedness. The session will also focus on investment policies (including FDI and in relation to establishing SEZ) and the role of the regional integration (in the form of the African Continental Free Trade Area) for Zambia's economy.
