

Minutes Kick-off Meeting of 2024-2025 Working Group on Cross-border Cartels 21 November 2024 14:00-16:00 (CET)

Based on the agreed conclusions of Intergovernmental Group of Experts on Competition Law and Policy in July 2024, the kick-off meeting of the Working Group on Cross-border Cartels (WG on CBCs) was held virtually on the 21st November 2024 at 14:00 CET for 2 hours. The UNCTAD secretariat gave a presentation of recommendations, and the participants commented and discussed about upcoming topics.

- 1. The meeting was opened and moderated by the UNCTAD secretariat.
- 2. The UNCTAD secretariat presented recommendations (listed below) for next year's substantive meetings.
- Disseminate the lessons learnt from the practical case studies in dealing with cross-border cartels and bid rigging
- Discuss tools and procedures on common issues against cross-border cartels and bid rigging
- Further advocacy work to disseminate and raise awareness of the GPP through case studies and sharing law enforcement experiences
- Promote international cooperation among competition authorities and facilitate information sharing and consultations
- 3. The UNCTAD secretariat suggested inviting Professor Marek Martyniszyn, professor of Competition Law and Policy at Queen's University Belfast in the United Kingdom, as an Academic Coordinator to provide insights into the practices of various competition authorities using his chain of enforcement theory, presented at the IGE in July 2024. Professor Marek Martyniszyn then presented his plans to participate in the working group as an academic coordinator. He proposed enhancing the group's work by focusing on specific stages of investigations and fostering the sharing of practices among member States to address cross-border enforcement challenges and information gaps. This aim will be achieved by means of sharing experiences of Group's Members as well as possible consideration of hypothetical scenarios in area of particular interests to Members.



- 4. Gian Marco Solas, a leading expert at the BRICS Competition Law and Policy Center, shared insights on his work in private enforcement of competition law, including third-party funding for litigation and a large cross-border class action. He is spearheading an initiative to diversify litigation funding to support broader cartel enforcement, emphasizing innovative industry approaches beyond traditional enforcement mechanisms. He invited interested parties to follow up for further details, highlighting the initiative's relevance to complex systems in competition law.
- 5. Next, an open discussion was held among the participants. The BRICS Competition Law and Policy Center shared insights on his work in private enforcement of competition law, including third-party funding for litigation and a large cross-border class action. He introduced an initiative to diversify litigation funding to support broader cartel enforcement, emphasizing innovative industry approaches beyond traditional enforcement mechanisms.
- 6. The Eurasian Economic Commission expressed support for the proposal to appoint an academic coordinator for the WG CBCs, emphasizing its potential to enhance efficiency. She agreed Professor Martyniszyn for the role, citing his extensive experience, and welcomed the initiative. Additionally, she conveyed the Eurasian Economic Commission's readiness to cooperate, share cases, and contribute their perspective once the topics and focus areas are clarified.
- 7. The competition authority of Austria asked about the designation of the Academic Coordinator for clarification on how he envisions his role, the specific outcomes he aims to achieve, and whether there are any potential conflicts of interest. Prof. Martyniszyn clarified that he has no conflicts of interest, inclusive of not having received any corporate sponsorship or funding—be it directly or via consultancies, emphasizing the importance of transparency. He highlighted the goal of narrowing information gaps between agencies involved in cross-border cases by focusing on shared challenges and solutions, particularly in processes like evidence collection and enforcement. He proposed structured, specific discussions, looking at the entirety of the chain of enforcement, to facilitate more effective information sharing and collaborative problem-solving, ultimately aiming for more efficient outcomes.



- 8. The competition authority of Switzerland requested prof. Martyniszyn to provide more details about his academic work that directly relates to the focus of the WG CBCs. Prof. Martyniszyn detailed his decade-long academic work on cross-border competition law, focusing on extraterritorial applications, jurisdictional challenges, and agency cooperation. He emphasized his research on the experiences of developing countries, highlighting disparities in how systems work for larger players versus smaller or Global South nations. He also said that he has shared his findings globally, including engagements with UNCTAD, Morocco's Competition Council, and China's Competition Agency.
- 9. After the open discussion, the UNCTAD secretariat proposed holding substantive meetings on February 20th and April 10th.
- 10. The UNCTAD secretariat confirmed that no participant opposed the secretariat's recommendations for next year's meetings or the designation of Professor Marek Martyniszyn as Academic Coordinator.
- 11. The UNCTAD secretariat encouraged member states to share valuable cases and closed the meeting.
