Background

With over 1.3 billion people, India is the second most populated country in the world. and is growing at a rate of 7% per year in GDP terms. In a context characterised by unprecedented economic dynamism and rapidly urbanising population, the country stands at the threshold of profound choices about the path to future development. In an interconnected world predicated largely on a linear economic model, India's development faces resource challenges and negative externalities - yet this scenario is not inevitable, and many opportunities can be derived from adopting a value-preserving model. Taking these factors into account this report specifically looks at the opportunities that a circular economy can bring to India.

The report offers insights based on extensive desk research, expert interviews and expert input events in India with participants from businesses, government, universities, NGOs and other organisations. A high-level economic analysis has been carried out to show potential benefits of following a circular development path for the Indian economy, environment and citizens. The research has developed detailed circular economy opportunities in three focus areas: cities and construction; food and agriculture; and mobility and vehicle manufacturing.

The Ellen MacArthur Foundation is delighted to share the insights of this latest work, done in cooperation with Indian government authorities, businesses and UNCTAD.
