UN Trade and Development (UNCTAD) is pleased to inform the permanent missions of member States in Geneva that UNCTAD will launch a new online course on trade policy frameworks, to take place in English from 14 October to 16 December 2024.

The course is based on the UNCTAD publication *Trade Policy Frameworks for Developing Countries: A Manual of Best Practices.* It will focus on considerations and processes involved in developing a national trade policy framework fit for the interests of a developing country. The course is aimed at enhancing and strengthening the technical capacity of trade officials and other stakeholders to develop appropriate trade policies in line with national sustainable development goals. Upon completing the course, participants will be equipped with the tools and skills required to devise a trade policy framework. The course targets government officials and other stakeholders, including trade experts from non-governmental organizations, involved in the formulation of a national trade policy framework. Online course: Trade policy frameworks 14 October–16 December 2024

Prospectus

Background

Trade policymaking is a challenging task in all countries and presents particularly significant difficulties for officials in developing countries. What may seem at first to be a purely external exercise is actually intimately related to national development policy as a whole and involves a series of domestic trade-offs. To formulate policy in this field, the interests of consumers and producers need to be balanced, while the goals of the most efficient and export-oriented industries need to be weighed against those of industries still aiming to achieve competitiveness.

Trade policymaking has become even more complicated in the context of current trade dynamics affected by geopolitical tensions and new industrial policies, particularly of developed economies. Trade policymakers need to have a reasoned plan that guides decisions and actions. A trade policy framework may respond to this need. Such a framework offers a structure for the many decisions that the negotiators, legislators and litigators of a country need to make as they devise and implement policy.

The course is based on the UNCTAD publication <u>Trade Policy Frameworks for Developing Countries: A Manual of Best Practices</u>. The manual is aimed at providing guidance on the development of a trade policy framework and situating trade policy as a branch of development policy. It is based largely on lessons learned from trade policy frameworks developed in the past, as well as on comparative data on the challenges faced by and the experiences of developing countries as a group.

The course will be offered in English over a period of nine weeks from **14 October to 16 December 2024**. It consists of nine modules, of which eight include pre-recorded videos prepared by the instructor, along with two webinars, to be held in October and December, at which participants can engage in interactive discussions with the principal course lecturer, as well as trade experts from UNCTAD and other international organizations.

Objectives

The course is aimed at enhancing and strengthening the technical capacity of trade officials and other stakeholders to develop appropriate trade policies in line with national sustainable development goals. As part of the UNCTAD trade policy electronic learning series, the course is tailored to respond to the needs of developing countries and the least developed countries. Upon completing the course, participants will be equipped with the tools and skills required to devise a trade policy framework. A detailed description of the course content and timetable is provided in the annex.



Target audience and prerequisites

The course targets government officials and other stakeholders, including trade experts from non-governmental organizations, involved in the formulation of a national trade policy framework. Applicants from a broad spectrum of backgrounds in policymaking including, but not limited to, international trade, industry, agriculture, services, the environment, labour and technology, are encouraged to apply.

Applicants must meet the following requirements:

- Hold at least a bachelor's degree in economics or related areas.
- Possess excellent knowledge of the English language.

To successfully complete course activities, participants need to devote around two hours per week to the course.

Certificate of completion

Participants who successfully complete the course modules and quizzes with passing grades will receive a certificate of completion.
