2023-2027 start of a new paradigm



Policy framework of the CAP

A European Green Deal

Overarching policy objectives for the EU's green transition.

- No net emissions of greenhouse gases by 2050
- Economic growth decoupled from resource use
- No person and no place left behind

Farm to fork Strategy

Biodiversity Strategy









The new CAP: from centralised to localised

Existing elements

- Conditional income support for farmers
- Ensuring resilient food production and improving market orientation
- Development of rural areas







New elements

- More flexibility on local conditions
- Increased ambition for economic, environmental and social sustainability
- Fairer distribution






New elements of the CAP

- National Strategic Plans
- Enhanced conditionality (GAEC)
- Ecoschemes
- Reinforced producer cooperation









Coupled income support

- 'Blue box' support
- Fixed amount of ha (13 140 ha in EU in 2022)
- Previous programming period: France, Poland, and Romania
- New programming period: France, Poland, Romania, and Finland (crop premium for hemp oil)





CAP measures supporting hemp cultivation

Ecoschemes

- additional support for voluntary environmental measures that go beyond conditionality
- Hemp specific measures (e.g. Belgium, Denmark)
- General measures for arable crops








