


3. Survey: Preparedness and resilience-building needs

COVID-19 and Maritime Supply Chain: Resilience-Building and Preparedness The COVID-19 disruption underscored the need for managing risks, building resilience, and enhancing preparedness in the face of disruptive factors affecting the maritime supply chain. In 2020, UNCTAD published an impact assessment report on "COVID-19 and Maritime Transport: Impact and Responses". The main findings of the assessment were disseminated during dedicated webinars organized in collaboration with the United Nations regional commissions, namely the UNECLAC, UNESCAP, UNESCWA, and UNECA. The present UNCTAD Questionnaire on "COVID-19 and Maritime Transport: Resilience-Building and Preparedness' follows on these earlier activities. The Questionnaire aims to gather input and hear your views about the pandemic and its impact on the maritime supply, response measures implemented, and resilience-building capabilities and needs. Input collected through the Questionnaire will be reflected in the UNCTAD report on "COVID-19 and Maritime Transport: Impact and Responses - An Update". The report which, will be published in the course of 2021, will provide an update of the impact assessment that had been carried out in 2020. The updated report will also identify resilience-building needs and the possible way forward. More importantly, input and feedback received by way of the Questionnaire, will inform UNCTAD's technical assistance work that focuses on helping countries enhance their capacity to build resilient maritime supply chains


Before the disruption materializes (ongoing):

Mainly strategies that aim to anticipate, plan, prepare, forecast, and integrate uncertainty through scenario planning, as well as invest in data and intelligence gathering for greater preparedness, elevant measures include scanning and monitoring mechanisms to trace and track evolving risks and stay up to date.

- During a disruption (immediate). Such as protocols and emergency responses.
- After a disruption (medium to long term).
 Includes actions that seek to mitigate impact, enable recovery and ensure adaptation to an emerging "new normal".
