

Growing services sector share in global employment


Sectoral decomposition of global employment, 1995-2013 (%)

Accelrated participation of developing economies in services trade


Services trade as percentage of GDP, 2005-2012 (%)

More and more workers are working in GSC-related jobs.


Number and share of jobs associated with GSCs, 1995-2011

Many of newly created GSCs-related jobs are in services sector.





Change in share of services jobs by sub-sector, 2000-11 (% points)





Employment along the GSCs

- → Need for policies for better work

Decent work and sustainable development

- Goal 1: End poverty in all its forms everywhere
- Goal 2: End hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition, and promote sustainable agriculture
- Goal 3: Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages
- Goal 4: Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote life-long learning opportunities for all
- Goal 5: Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls
- Goal 6: Ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all
- Goal 7: Ensure access to affordable, reliable, sustainable, and modern energy for all

Goal 8: Promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all

- Goal 9: Build resilient infrastructure, promote inclusive and sustainable industrialization and foster innovation
- Goal 10: Reduce inequality within and among countries
- Goal 11: Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable
- Goal 12: Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns

- ILO Declaration on Social Justice for a Fair Globalization (2008):

 - Decent work as a response to the challenges of globalization
- ILO Declaration on MNE (1977)
 - Contribution of MNEs to social progress
- Decent Work Agenda
 - Promoting social and economic advancement through decent work
 - Support for countries in the multilateral system

Key policies areas

- Better protection of workers in GSCs
 - Broad-based social protection
 - Protecting worker's rights
 - Education and training for mobility
- Broad based macro policies
 - Linking wages and working conditions to increased productivity
 - Diversification of domestic and export markets
 - Trade and investment policies
- Facilitating transitions to formal employment
 - Simpler procedures for registration
 - Lower taxes for SMEs
- Increasing compliance

Achieving decent work in GSC

- Corporate Social Responsibility: voluntary basis
- Social dialogue for better links between economic and social benefits in GSCs
 - The ILO Better Work Programme
 - The Bangladesh Accord on Fire and Building Safety
