Findings and recommendations

Recommendations to Competition agencies:

- Competition policy during times of economic difficulties is part of the solution not the problem;
- The importance of applying competition policy to State Owned enterprises to avoid waste;
- The importance of ensuring coherence between competition and other economic policies;
- The need to take into account public and consumer interests when applying competition law
- The need to enhance cooperation in addressing cross border cartels, abuse of dominance and other anti-competitive conducts;
- The importance of ensuring that Anti-competitive practices do not negate the benefits of trade and investment liberalisation.



Findings and recommendations

Recommendations to Competition agencies:

- Peer reviews recommendations should be used as need assessment for capacity building;
- Countries should continue to learn from each others and exchange best practices;
- UNCTAD should monitor and report on the implementations of peer review findings and recommendations
- UNCTAD should continue to cooperate with other relevant international organisations
- UNCTAD should continue to disseminate the IGE recommendations including through peer reviews and capacity building
