The survey

3SSC (2020): UNCTAD to conduct a global assessment on key challenges, opportunities and solutions related to COVID-19 for stakeholders in the biodiversity sector

A study based on a survey was conducted **a** Report "Implications of COVID-19 for biodiversity-based products and services, including BioTrade" being finalized by Mario Jales and will be published in the second half of 2021

4 different surveys were prepared in 4 different languages for participants from 4 different institutional categories: **private sector**, **government institutions**, **support organizations and individual experts**


- Most of the questions were common to all four surveys but some questions were also sector specific
- The majority of questions were asked through a multiple choice format

The sample

The survey received 382 responses during the ten-week period in which it was open – of which 307 were valid


Nearly three quarters of respondents come from either the private sector or support organizations

Nearly half of respondents come from the American continent





Challenges brought by COVID-19

Respondents reporting an overall negative impact from the COVID-19 pandemic




Extent of the negative impact from the COVID-19 pandemic

Impact of COVID-19 on private sector organizations' revenues













COVID-related measures

Reduced production of goods or services
Postponed or cancelled investments




Measures most implemented in response to COVID-19, by region


Government support

Reported public support measures in support to the COVID-19 pandemic



Government support measures most needed by private sector organizations




Public support measures most implemented by support organizations (NGOs, academia, BSOs, certification bodies, etc.)





