Excellencies,
Distinguished Delegates,
Ladies and Gentlemen,

I am honoured to address you at the opening of the 28th session of the Commission on Science and Technology for Development.

The Commission's work is more critical than ever. We are living in an era of rapid technological advancement, where science, technology, and innovation offer solutions to many of the global challenges we are facing such as climate change, health crises, food insecurity, just to name a few. STI is already such a powerful tool for achieving the Sustainable Development Goals.

Yet, we have to admit that not all are profiting equally. Many developing countries face challenges accessing emerging technologies, such as Artificial Intelligence, and lack the adequate digital infrastructure and technical knowledge to be full participants in the digital economy.

We cannot leave these gaps unaddressed. Doing so risks deepening inequalities and hindering progress that we've all made towards the 2030 Agenda.

As President of ECOSOC, I am convening a Special Meeting on May 6th to discuss the potential for AI to accelerate sustainable development in the Global South, and the role of investment, capacity-building, and international cooperation in bridging the gaps.



The ECOSOC Special Meeting will lead into the 10th multi-stakeholder forum on Science, Technology and Innovation for Sustainable Development – where we will continue this very important conversation.
