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Abstract

With 8.9% annual rise in current dollar values, world services exports surpassed US\$7.9 trillion in 2023.

For the fourth quarter of 2023, the quarter-on-quarter seasonally adjusted growth rate of services exports was estimated at 0.5%, pointing to a slowdown in global services trade over the last few months of 2023.

Region-wise, Q4 witnessed mixed year-on-year services trade trends, with the highest relative expansion recorded for Asia and Oceania.

The main driver of the year-on-year rise of services exports in Q4 2023 was the ample growth of international travel receipts. Year-on-year (YoY) quarterly growth was negative for transport in all 4 quarters.

1. Global services exports

World services exports grew by 8.9% in 2023.

With 8.9% annual rise in current dollar values, world services exports surpassed US\$7.9 trillion in 2023. International travel receipts increased by 40%, continuing the recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic throughout the year. Transport dropped by some 12% in 2023. Year-on-year (YoY) quarterly growth was negative for transport in all 4 quarters. Other services, many of which can be traded digitally, recorded a solid rise over the year, surpassing 7% in each quarter.

2. Regional developments


Highest relative expansion recorded for Asia and Oceania.

Region-wise, Q4 witnessed mixed year-on-year services trade trends, with the highest relative expansion recorded for Asia and Oceania. In this region and in Europe, imports grew faster than exports, while it was opposite for the Americas. Latin America and the Caribbean recorded negative imports growth for Q4 (YoY). These trends are also related to the developments in currencies' exchange rates.

The main driver of the YoY rise of services exports in Q4 2023 was the ample growth of international travel receipts. In the post COVID-19 recovery, travel receipts increased by 70% in Asia (YoY). By contrast, their transport exports dropped by 15%. Only in Northern America did transports exports rise compared to Q4 2022. In Q4 2023, other services exports increased significantly in Europe and in Asia and Oceania (YoY). Latin America and the Caribbean recorded a negative YoY growth for these services for the same period.

Notes

The presented trade in services statistics follow the IMF Balance of Payments Manual 6 (BPM6, 2009) classification.

Quarterly estimates are based on the statistics available in national and international sources for some 150 economies, representing over 85% of total international services trade.

* Other represents a heterogeneous group of products dominated by various business services, telecommunications and computer services, intellectual-property, insurance and financial services. They are further comprised of construction, personal, cultural and recreational services, and government goods and services (n.i.e.). For this presentation, manufacturing, processing and repair services are also included under other.

The seasonally adjusted figures are UNCTAD secretariat estimates compiled for a selection of main services items, using the X-11 seasonal adjustment method. Each series was adjusted based on its values in current US\$. Consequently, the seasonally adjusted total services do not represent the exact sum of relevant seasonally adjusted sub-categories. In the same way, the seasonally adjusted series for groups of economies do not represent the exact sum of the seasonally adjusted country-level series.
